HIX-4011 Wesleyan History and Discipline

Course Overview

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Credit Hours: 1.5hrs

Course Description

The course will examine the theological and historical events and people who helped shape the development of The Wesleyan Church from its roots in early Methodism to the present. Emphasis will focus on identifying the key distinctive values of the Church in its beginning stages and how these values continue to shape the message and mission of the Church today. The course will also provide an opportunity to gain a working knowledge of the Wesleyan Discipline as a helpful tool for church governance and administration.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

1. Identify the key persons, events, and social milieu that helped to shape *The Wesleyan Church*.
2. Identify the theological heritage of *The Wesleyan Church* in the larger context of the Christian Church with an ability to articulate key historical and doctrinal distinctives.
3. Identify the social justice heritage of The Wesleyan Church, which addressed several injustices such as poverty, sex trafficking, racism, and sexism, as well as ways in which this social justice heritage continues to shape Wesleyan ministry today.
4. Discover key values and practices that were instrumental in the founding of The Wesleyan Church and how those values and techniques continue to shape theology and practice today.
5. Identify the critical organizational elements of The Wesleyan Church at the local, regional/district and denominational level and how these corporate groups work together in striving to fulfill the mission of the Church.
6. Develop a working knowledge of *The Discipline of The Wesleyan Church* as a resource for Wesleyan Church ministry.

7. Know the polity and Discipline of The Wesleyan Church and be able to apply it to ministry within the local church setting.
